As I look back on this past year, I am both humbled and inspired by what we have accomplished together. APIA Scholars has continued to grow, adapt, and strengthen our mission of educating, elevating, and empowering Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander (AANHPI) and all students. But none of this would have been possible without you; our donors, partners, alumni, and friends.

This year, we awarded 487 Scholars totaling \$3.5 million, opening doors for students who might otherwise have been shut out of higher education. For many of our Scholars, your support has meant far more than financial assistance. It has meant opportunity and confidence in their future.

Beyond Scholarships, we expanded our Student Success Programs through networking opportunities, career workshops, financial literacy and more. They combine to give our Scholars the skills to succeed in college and beyond.

Yet resources are limited, and thousands of qualified students' needs remain unmet. At a time when higher education is under pressure, funding is cut, and when many of our communities face growing challenges, organizations like APIA Scholars are more important than ever.

Your generosity fuels transformation not only in the lives of individual Scholars, but also in the communities they will uplift for generations to come. We know from our research that APIA Scholars' persistence rate is 10 to 20 percentage points above the national average. IMPACT

For over 20 years, APIA Scholars has advanced educational opportunity, expanded inclusivity, and elevated college-to-career success for Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander (AANHPI) students and all students. Since our founding, we have served more than 12,000 students across all 50 states and U.S. territories, awarding over \$261 million in scholarships, with 71% of recipients being first-generation college students and 62% coming from families at or below the poverty line.

As part of our comprehensive 2025 data and impact review, we refined how we calculate lifetime impact.

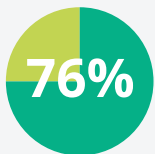
FROM ACCESS TO ACHIEVEMENT: OUR SCHOLARS' PERSISTENCE RATE

APIA Scholars are achieving at rates far above the national average. Our students consistently outperform, with persistence rates that soar 10 to 20 percentage points higher than the national average.

These outcomes demonstrate what's possible when financial support is paired with community, mentorship, and student success programming. APIA Scholars aren't just accessing higher education—they are completing it, at rates that set them apart nationwide.

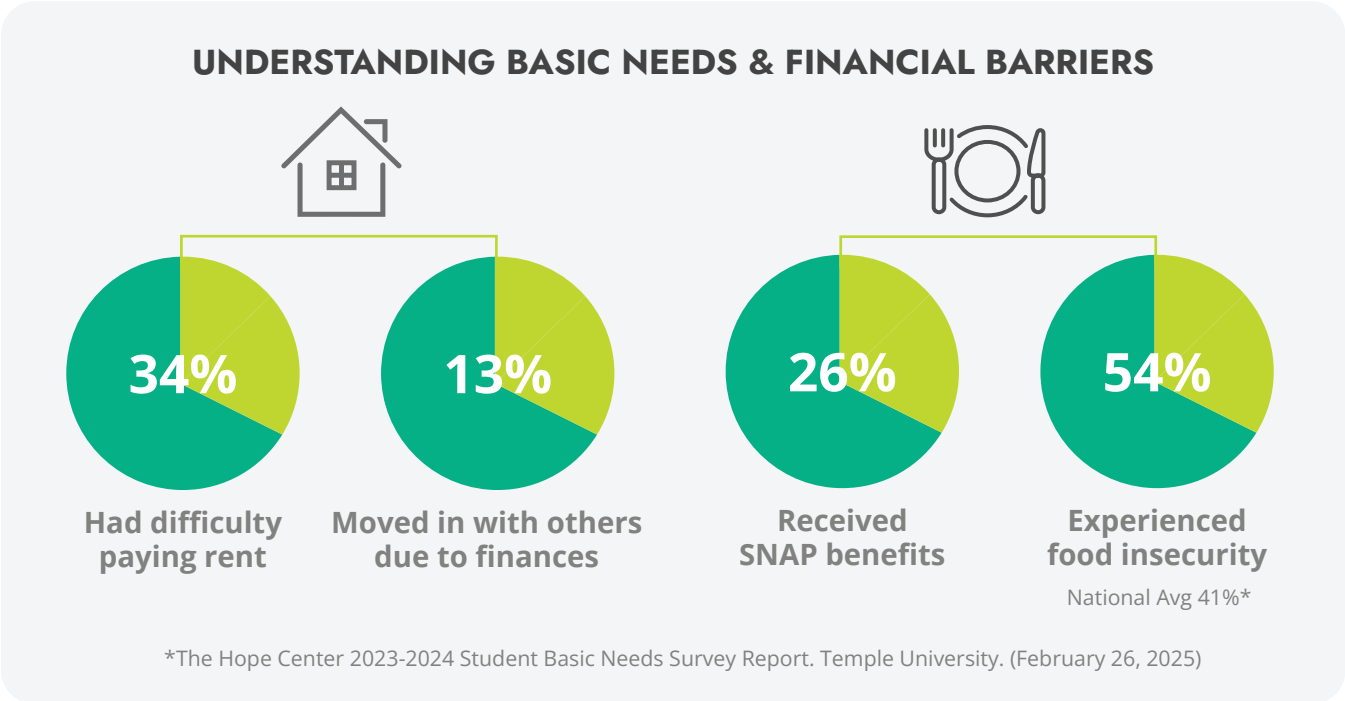
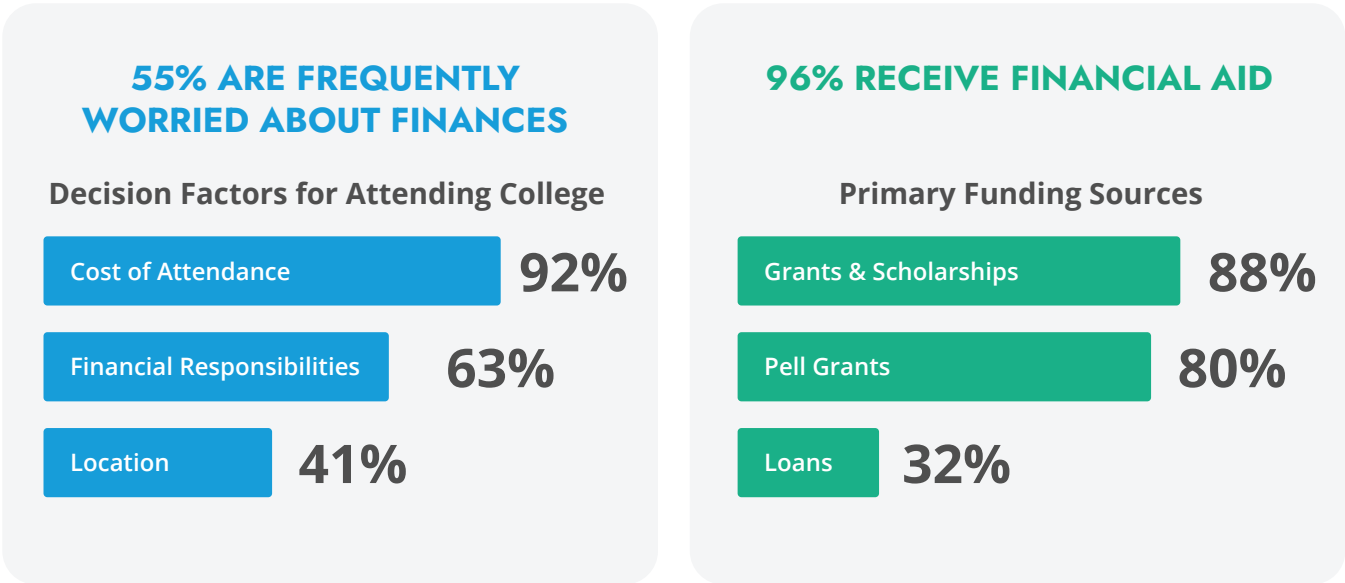
Methodology: The National Student Clearinghouse (NSC) tracks 97% of U.S. postsecondary enrollment and 96% of degrees, enabling analysis of student outcomes and persistence. This study examined 4,094 APIA Scholars from 2017-18 to 2024-25, with an 86% match rate to NSC records, and presents findings on enrollment, degree attainment, persistence, transfer patterns, and outcomes for two-year enrollees.



BEHIND THE NUMBERS: BARRIERS TO COMPLETION

While persistence outcomes highlight the strength and determination of our Scholars, it is equally important to understand the barriers that remain. 2025 Scholars National Survey examines the barriers and challenges our students face, and will inform our Scholarships approach and Student Success Programming. Our 2,412 respondents include both scholarship recipients as well as applicants and alumni.

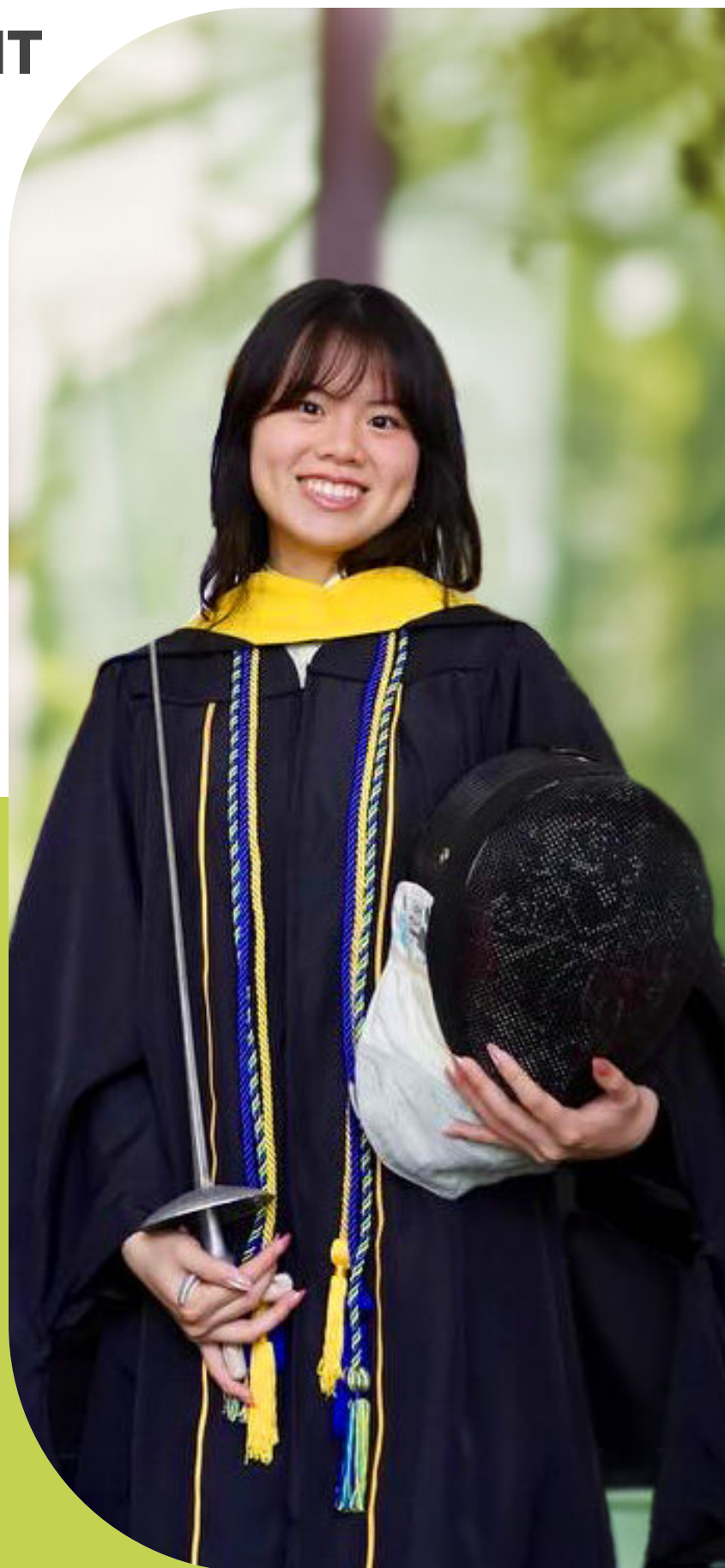

In FY24–25, APIA Scholars deepened our commitment to students most in need as evidenced in our increased percentage of awards going to first-generation college students and those from low-income backgrounds. **More than eight in ten of our Scholars are the first in their families to attend college, and 62% live at or below the poverty line, a significant increase from 54% last year.**

With \$3.46 million awarded to 487 Scholars representing 52 diverse ethnicities, we are advancing our strategic plan to deliver impact with focus and intention.

ROBERT UNDERWOOD SCHOLARSHIP: HONORING A LEGACY

APIA Scholars launched the Dr Robert Underwood Scholarship in honor of Founding Board Member Dr. Robert Underwood, who dedicated his life to serving and advocating for the AANHPI community. His vision and leadership continue to inspire our mission and live on through this program. This is an innovative pilot scholarship to better support students in the Pacific Islands with high financial need. The program provides up to \$10,000 per year for up to two years for tuition and fees, plus up to \$2,500 annually for essential living expenses such as housing, food, transportation, and healthcare.

SCHOLAR RELIEF FUNDS: A LIFELINE DURING HARDSHIPS

At APIA Scholars, we recognize that unexpected financial hardships can derail a student's education. Our Scholar Relief Funds is a need-based financial assistance that provides timely, flexible support to APIA Scholarship recipients. These funds are designed to ensure that a sudden challenge, such as a medical bill, housing insecurity, or the loss of childcare, does not force a student to pause or abandon their educational journey.

CAREER DEVELOPMENT FUND: INVESTMENT IN COLLEGE-TO-CAREER SUCCESS

In alignment with our strategic plan to lower financial barriers for our Scholars, APIA Scholars sought to remove financial barriers that limit students' access to internships and career-building experiences, APIA Scholars launched the Career Development Fund in 2025. This program provides opportunity grants to support Scholars with demonstrated financial need in pursuing internships, fellowships, conferences, research, and other career development opportunities. By prioritizing students in historically underpaid fields or those requiring relocation, the fund ensures that more Scholars can gain the skills, connections, and experiences essential for long-term professional success.

STUDENT SUCCESS PROGRAMS

IMPACT BEYOND SCHOLARSHIPS

While financial aid provides access to higher education, long-term success demands additional support. APIA Scholars' Student Success Programs are designed to equip students with the skills, confidence, and networks necessary to navigate their academic journeys and transition into meaningful careers. In FY 2024–2025, we enhanced these efforts by expanding programming in Fall Financial Literacy series, Spring Career Workshops, CareerFest and Scholar Advisory Board.



FALL FINANCIAL SERIES — MANAGING FINANCIAL BARRIERS WITH CONFIDENCE

In Fall 2024, APIA Scholars launched a virtual Financial Literacy & Wellness Workshop Series as part of our intentional effort to lowering financial barriers into practical, real-life application for our Scholars. By equipping Scholars and alumni with essential financial skills, this series empowers them not only to manage the immediate costs of college but also to build lasting habits that strengthen their long-term stability and success. The workshops created a supportive space to address the real cost of college, secure financial aid, develop smart money strategies, and manage financial stress with confidence.

FROM COLLEGE-TO-CAREER: SPRING CAREER SUPPORT WORKSHOP SERIES

At APIA Scholars, we recognize that true success extends beyond college admission to the achievement of meaningful careers and lifelong impact. In Spring 2025, APIA Scholars hosted a three-part Career Support Workshop Series that guided students through personal branding, the job search process, and building professional networks. Together, these sessions equipped Scholars with the skills and confidence to transition from college to career and to pursue opportunities with purpose.

CAREERFEST 2.0: A PLATFORM FOR REAL-WORLD PREPARATION

In April in Los Angeles, APIA Scholars hosted CareerFest 2.0, an immersive event for our Scholars that focused on career readiness and professional growth. What started in 2023 has now grown into a cornerstone of our college-to-career strategy—designed to help students gain the confidence and preparation in getting started in their careers.
